The Columbia High School Varsity Boys Cross Country Team is headed to the New Jersey State Group IV Championship as one of the top five finishers in New Jersey Group IV, Section 2 championship.

Columbia was paced by junior Jared Pangallozzi, who finished $8^{\rm th}$ out of 123 runners on the 5K course while sophomore David Ives placed $27^{\rm th}$ in 17:04. Pangallozzi qualified for the Group 4 Championships as an individual with his top ten finish.

Columbia's medal-winning performance was a 5^{th} -place finish out of 16 teams.

The Columbia High School Girls Volleyball Team was co-champions of the Colonial Division of the Super Essex Conference.

Lisa Morgan, Columbia HS cross country and track coach and Charles Schneekloth, Language Arts Teacher at Maplewood Middle School were both selected by *Garden State Runs* in their yearly "Top 25 Most Influential People in NJ Running" list.

Marshall Elementary School was one of 17 schools in New Jersey to be awarded a grant from the Artists in Education Residency Grant Program (AIE) to engage a professional Teaching Artist this school year. One hundred of Marshall's 198 first graders are working with artist Patricia Flynn for hands on workshops to create a theatrical collage through an immersion of various art forms. The Artists in Education (AIE) Program is carried out through a cosponsored partnership between Young Audiences New Jersey & Eastern Pennsylvania and the New Jersey State Council on the Arts.

SUPERINTENDENT'S MONTHLY UPDATE

Goal 1

Student Learning and promoting the intellectual growth of all students:

- The marking period ended last week and report cards are going out to all secondary school students.
- Flexible Academic Support Time (FAST) study hall academic support is being assigned to Columbia High School students who may be struggling.
- 48.5% of our senior class has already applied to college. Students have already begun to receive early acceptances including to the University of Pittsburgh Honors Program, Penn State, and Rutgers.
- Columbia High School hosted the State Student Council Meeting today.
- Columbia High School hosted the US First FTC Robotics Tournament over the weekend.

• Individual student Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) scores will be released by the State soon. A parent meeting about the PARCC scores is being planned.

Goal 2 Professional Staff:

• November 3rd was a full day of professional development for all staff with topics ranging from Harassment, Intimidation and Bullying (HIB) and CPR training, to differentiated instruction, to restorative practices, to cultural competency training.

Goal 3 Engagement and Outreach:

- There will be an update on our pilot of Let's Talk! and it is on tonight's agenda for action.
- Public wifi is now available in the district meeting room during Board meetings.
- The newly formed website committee is scheduled to meet with vendors this month to review proposals to reconceptualize our district website. We hope to bring a recommendation to the Board for a new vendor in December.
- Board members and senior staff will be meeting with town officials from Maplewood and South Orange to strengthen our partnership.
- Upcoming parent engagement events include an overview of the new Gifted and Talented Strategies and an introduction to restorative practices.

Goal 4 Resource Management:

- On for first reading tonight is an update to the school nutrition policy 8505 which combines the nutrition and wellness policy.
- The auditor's report, originally scheduled for tonight, has been postponed to the December meeting. Due to state delays in releasing information regarding pension payments to districts.
- A resolution to submit the annual statement of assurance relating to Quality Single Accountability Continuum (QSAC) is on the agenda this evening. This is for the school year 2015-2016 and is a different set of data than the full QSAC report that required an improvement plan for the 2014-2015 school year. The checklist on the statement of assurance are different than those on the full review and therefore are likely to have different ratings.

Goal 5 Creating a Framework for Advancing the work of the district including the collaborative development of a comprehensive Strategic Plan:

- An Education Summit was held to engage all stakeholders in the initial stage of developing our Strategic Plan. There will be a report on the Summit during the discussion portion.
- A KIVA session on the topic of mathematics is being planned.

Goal 6 Securing required external approvals:

• Middle States Accreditation for Columbia High School

- o The Middle States Association will be visiting Columbia High School in March 2016.
- o The Columbia High School team is working the Middle States Team Chair to align strategic planning for the high school with topics from the Education Summit.
- o Administration is awaiting Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) scores to determine whether or not PARCC scores might be used as baseline data points to measure student achievement growth.
- Office of Civil Rights (OCR) Resolution Agreement
 - o The Office of Civil Rights is extremely positive about the new Access & Equity policy which the board adopted last month.

EDUCATION SUMMIT - Mrs. Weiland and Mrs. Turner

Mrs. Weiland and Mrs. Turner presented a PowerPoint presentation summarizing the November 16, Education Summit. The Education Summit was a key step in creating a Strategic Plan for the District. The Community helped determine the topics by submitting their ideas via Let's Talk, email and other input. After extensive outreach to the community and planned logistics of the committee the Education Summit was a success with over 1500 attendees including teachers, administrators, students, parents, guardians and other community members. The data and ideas collected at the Education Summit will be used for the next steps in creating the Strategic Plan. [Presentation on file in Board Secretary's Office]

Dr. Ramos talked about the next steps following the Summit. The intent is to have strategic direction and something to approve and pass by the end of January 2016. The strategic direction will help inform the 2016-2017 budget. The next step after approval would be to develop action plans that will take longer to develop. The action plans will help inform the 2017-2018 budget.

Board discussion followed the presentation including but not limited to the following:

- Received positive feedback from the Summit.
- Questioned how additional data will be collected.
- Asked about the possibility of another summit.
- Discussed the potential for a student forum.

$\underline{\text{LET'S TALK UPDATE}}$ - Mr. Roth and Mrs. Turner

Mr. Roth and Mrs. Turner presented a Powerpoint presentation on the benefits seen from the pilot of Let's Talk.

- Easy way for stakeholders to make contact at any time.

- Internal process for collaboration, sharing work and removing silos.
- Track trending issues and areas of concern.
- Interactive tool for big topics such as the Education Summit.
- Provides accountability tools.

Policy 2314 Academic Placement Revision - 1st reading

Ms. Baker introduced the procedural background in creating this policy. Dr. Ramos talked about the content of the policy and that it maintains levels in the current form but allows for the possibility of reform through pilots. It calls for non-binding guidance and allows parents and students the option of access as they choose.

Board discussion included the following:

- Support to insure student success.
- Academic placement versus leveling.
- Robust classes at all levels in grades K-12.
- Need for increased academic support.

Mr. Stern reviewed other policies:

- Policy 5330 Administration of Medication 1st reading.
- ullet Policy 5339 Screening for Dyslexia 1st reading.
- \bullet Policy 8505 Wellness/ Nutrient Standards for Meals and other Foods $1^{\rm st}$ reading.

Policy is based on federal requirements for nutrition. References to the allowance for infrequent bake sales will be added back for the second reading.

• Policy 8510 Wellness Policy - REPEAL - 1st reading.

WHEREAS, the School Funding Reform Act ("SFRA") uses a student need-based formula to determine financial state aid for school districts; and WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey produced "For Information Only" State Aid Notices for the 2015-2016 school year (FY16) that included Total "Aid Before Cap", or uncapped aid; and WHEREAS New Jersey's aid distribution is severely uneven, with 220 districts receiving 100% or more of their SFRA FY16 uncapped aid and 118 receiving 50% or less; and

WHEREAS, in per student terms, 112 districts receive aid surpluses greater than \$1,000 a student and 25 receive surpluses over \$3,000 a student while 73 districts have deficits greater than \$3,000 a student and 154 have deficits greater than \$1,000 a student, with the most extreme surpluses and deficits reaching \$10,000 a student; and

WHEREAS, the inequity of the distribution is becoming more odious, as districts become poorer or richer, smaller or larger, and yet districts gaining wealth and/or losing student population do not lose aid nor do districts becoming poorer and/or gaining student population gain aid; and

WHEREAS, the excess aid given to over-aided districts based on actual aid compared to uncapped SFRA aid for FY16 is almost \$600 million; and

WHEREAS, the South Orange and Maplewood School District ("SOMSD") is an under-aided school district, receiving less than 50% of the FY16 SFRA uncapped aid amount which is based on student need; and
