BOARD PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

The School Board meeting is a business meeting in public not a meeting with the public. Oftentimes it may appear to members of our audience that the Board of Education takes action with very little comment and in many cases a unanimous vote. Before a matter is placed on the agenda at a public meeting, the Administration has thoroughly reviewed the matter with the Superintendent of Schools/Chief School Administrator (CSA). If the Superintendent of Schools/Chief School Administrator is satisfied that the matter is ready to be presented to the Board of Education, it is then referred to the appropriate Board Committee. The Members of the Board Committee work with Administration and the Superintendent to assure that the members fully understand the matter. After the committee discusses the matter, it is presented to the full Board for discussion before any action is taken. Only then, is it placed on the agenda for action at a public meeting.

HEARING OF INDIVIDUALS AND DELEGATIONS

Abigail Murtagh

We have recently heard about the programming the district has put in place to address student learning loss. You've devoted many resources to bridging the academic gap. I am speaking tonight to ask the board to ask the District to devote the same resources to creating equally robust programs to address the social and emotional gap our students are facing. Many students are not ok. They are suffering from anxiety and depression, they have lost love ones, they have lost opportunities and milestones. They have not been able to process this massive upheavel in their lives. They are anxious about reentering school spaces, navigating friendship and disagreements. While some students are thrilled to be back in school others are reentering a space that has not been positive or nurturing for them. Our district must step in and help these students. I know the district has increased the number of social workers meeting with students this year and this is helping many. But it is only helping those who speak up and all of our students can benefit greatly from the support of our social work professionals. I am asking you to use the expertise of the district social workers to develop specific age appropriate social emotional curricula that can be delivered to students in the fall. Create programs that will give students the space and vocabulary to better understand and express what they are experiencing. Create a framework that classes can use throughout the year to do this work. Please do not just rely on social workers being available to those who reach out. Please do not just set aside time blocks and class schedules or distribute a list of generic topics for teachers to build upon. Please take the time over the next months to use the resources you have to create a specific scaffolded robust social emotional program to help all of our students.

I would like to say to Dr. Taylor and the Board that it is time to open our schools for full-time learning for all students five days per week. I did some research today and learned that more than 3.5 million people in New Jersey are fully vaccinated. Additionally 4,813,516 have received their first dose of the vaccine. We also know that more than 75% of the teachers in our district are vaccinated. High school students have been eligible for the vaccine for several weeks now and today the vaccine was approved for children 12 and older. I've also learned that over 102% of persons age 65 and older have been vaccinated and as expected, as the number of people vaccinated rise the number of COVID cases has fallen. Today there were 459 new cases reported in the whole state. There were zero reported in South Orange today and two in Maplewood. Essex County as a whole has a change of -41 reported cases. Vaccines work! That framework in mind, we must now reopen the schools to all of our students but especially to our middle and high school students five days per week full time. We no longer have to wait and see. With the science and data that has emerged over the last year we know that the risk of becoming

infected with COVID in a school setting is extremely low and in fact is lower than the transmission rate in our communities. Dr. Taylor you have acknowledged that there is no evidence that COVID is being transmitted in our schools. Please do not brush off the last few weeks of school for the students. To them, these six weeks are everything. Six weeks to really engage in their academics, to be with their teachers, to see their friends, form new friendships, return to health and normalcy and to recoup a small portion of all they lost this year. Dr. Taylor, I implore you, give our children their six weeks.

Firstly, I want to thank everyone who has worked so hard this year to get our children back to school for in-person learning this year. Now that our community has reached the medium level on the risk matrix and cases continue to trend downward, we need to give kids in grades 6-12 more in-person learning opportunities. According to both CDC and NJ guidelines middle schoolers can be 3' apart in schools which should allow all those who are attending in person to attend 5 days per week. Every additional day of in-person instruction for our kids is critical and the district should do everything possible to maximize the number of in-person instructional hours for our students from now through the end of the year.

Our formerly school-loving kids have had little to no motivation while learning virtually, and the extended school time would be an enormous help not only to get them back on track academically but also for their social and emotional health.

I am writing to advocate for 5 days per week of school for middle and high school students and consideration of permitting them to leave campus or eat outside and return after lunch. These kids have lost out on so much. I have observed a dramatic improvement in their emotional health on the days that they are in person. These children need more and a return to a 5 day a week schedule and longer days. The high school students have had a half day schedule for more than a year. It is ludicrous. They have lost the ability to sustain a full day of classwork which will not serve them well in the future.

Spring and mild temperatures, widely available vaccines, and decreasing community spread provide this. Other districts within our county have middle and high schools students attending daily. Schools with old buildings have middle and high school students attending daily. Communities with diverse populations have students attending daily. To all who have worked to transition the school district to Phase 5, thank you. My 8th grader attended in-person school for the first time on April 26. I observed more engagement in school and a lighter, more positive disposition immediately. My 6th grader had several days in school prior to April, but the consistent in-person instruction is having a noted positive effect on him as well.

Knowing that all grades are back to in-person instruction is a relief. But our work is not done. Spring and mild temperatures, widely available vaccines, and decreasing community spread provide the opportunity to move to more in-person instruction for middle and high school students. Let's work toward having middle and high schoolers to attend school five days per week. Other districts within our county have middle and high schools students attending daily. Schools will old buildings have middle and high school students attending daily. Communities with diverse populations have students attending daily. Every District is unique, but there is nothing specific about our District that makes it more vulnerable to COVID spread.

Although we have had positive cases in the buildings, I believe that there has not been in-school spread. Masking, hand hygiene, windows open it is working. With the NJDOH reporting that New Jersey is now at "moderate" risk and in the yellow, it would be a perfect time to reevaluate in person learning for Middle School and High School students especially since our numbers continue to decline and our community spread is low. With more

and more people able to be vaccinated, which includes 16 years and older, our numbers will continue to decline. Can you please advise if the district is working towards adding more days for these students? I am specifically concerned with Middle School as I have a 6th grader who would benefit for more in person days. The social and emotional toll remote learning has brought to my child, and I am sure many others in the district are devastating. Many students are feeling a lot of anxiety about going back to school and being with their peers, not because they are worried about getting COVID, but because they have forgotten how to talk to and be around other kids after being alone in their bedrooms doing school. The Middle School years are such a socially important time for these kids as they are learning and craving more independence, something that is not happening while they are behind a computer screen at home.

Many districts across NJ have been back 5 days, whether it be half days or full days for a while, but with the news of NJ now being moderate risk and hopefully most teachers/staff are now vaccinated and hopefully more students are in the process of being vaccinated, I hope you are having conversations with your counterparts across the area to see how they are making this work, and with the BOE to work towards getting all of our kids back full time.

There is no reason why, if other districts can be 5 full days that we can't do this, even 5 half days would be a win at this point. Why is Maplewood DOH advising against lunch when other districts are allowing lunch as part of their full day program? Livingston Public Schools are back full time as of today, May 10th, Millburn Middle and High School are full days, still with cohorts, but alternate Friday's, they also have tents for set up outside for lunch with the auditorium and gym as back up). Can you also speak to what the district plans for the fall? There should be nothing other than 5 full days.

Our children deserve this, with only 6 weeks left of school, let's end on a high note and bring all the kids back.

Her teacher has noticed that she is much more engaged now that she's in more of a routine and in a classroom with most of her classmates. Are there any plans to get the children in for full days for the remaining weeks of school we have left this year? With warmer weather upon us, can we get creative to also utilize outdoor space for snack and lunch breaks, use tents during inclement weather (as long as it's not too dangerous?

It would be a mistake to try to just ride this out and by doing the work now and iterating as needed, it can help make opening up full time in the fall much easier."

Dr. Taylor responded to comments made during the Hearing of Individuals and Delegations with the following statement:

To those who spoke and wrote in your sentiment is obvious and is definitely acknowledged. This is a Special Board Meeting focused on the reappointment of staff members so I cannot give as detailed a response as I usually would, because it will take away from what this meeting was originally advertised for. I can share very briefly that we have not given up on opening. We have scheduled our Departments of Health to check-in as we stated in our Phase 3 Update. Our County is now yellow which makes our spread risk moderate not zero. Our Departments of Health have very granular township information that shows trends and we are still working towards returning. We are ecstatic that we have students from all of our grade levels returning to in-person instruction. We are still being cautious because we are still in a health crisis and we have to remember that. I will have more information as we meet with the Departments of Health.

NEW BUSINESS

Board Member Siders opened a discussion on converting a standing Board Committee (Curriculum and Instruction Committee C&I) to a committee of the whole, which means all Board members will be a member of the committee. Board Member Siders is making this recommendation because there is a lot of information presented at the C&I Committee meetings that can be beneficial to all Board Members to hear. The C&I Committee receives a lot of presentations about items that eventually come to the Board for approval because they have a financial impact. The rest of the Board has to make decisions on whether or not to pass these initiatives

but the Board does not receive the presentations or information needed to make these decisions. Star Renaissance and Teacher's College presentations are examples of the presentations that would be beneficial to all Board members. At tomorrow's C&I meeting there will be a presentation on Effective School Solutions (ESS) program based at Columbia High School and detailed information about what is being proposed for our summer school programs. This information should be shared with the entire Board. Historically C&I has been a challenging committee for the Board. It is difficult to make decisions and for decisions to reside on the shoulders of four members when it really needs the dedication and input of all Board Members.

Board members discuss Board Members Siders' recommendation. The public will be able to participate in committee meetings of the whole.

Dr. Taylor and the Board discussed how to move forward with a committee of the whole and the need to streamline the C&I committee.

Ms. Butler reminded the Board that if policies and/or bi-laws need to be changed in order to create a committee of the whole that these changes will require first and second reading.
