A Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of South Orange-Maplewood was held in the District Meeting Room at the Administration Building, 525 Academy Street, Maplewood, New Jersey as well as utilizing the online video conference platform on October 18, 2023.

This evening we will have two presentations from the District, the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment presentation and the Student Safety Data System presentation/HIB Self-assessment for the 2022-23 school year.

Board President Wittleder made a motion, seconded by Board Member Malespina to adjust this evening's agenda after the Board returns from Executive Session to move up resolution 4531 for Action, followed by the Board President's Update, Board President's Statement and then the first Hearing of Individuals and Delegates to occur before the Superintendent's update. Motion unanimously approved.

Motion made by President Wittleder, seconded by Board Member Malespina to approve the following:

SOUTH ORANGE-MAPLEWOOD BOARD OF EDUCATION RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING EXECUTIVE SESSION

WHEREAS, while the "Sen. Byron M. Baer Open Public Meetings Act" (N.J.S.A. 10:4-6 et seq.) requires all meetings of the South Orange Maplewood Board of Education to be held in public, N.J.S.A. 10:4-12(b) sets forth nine (9) types of matters that may lawfully be discussed in "Executive Session," without the public being permitted to attend, and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that one (1) issue is permitted by N.J.S.A 10:4-12 (b) to be discussed without the public in attendance and shall be discussed during an Executive Session to be held on Thursday, September 28, 2023 at 6:30 PM, and

WHEREAS, the nine (9) exceptions to open the public meetings set forth in N.J.S.A 10:2-4(b) are listed below, and next to each exception is a box which will be marked when the issues to be privately discussed fall within that exception, and after each exception is a space where additional information that will disclose as much information about the discussion as possible without undermining the purpose of the exception shall be written:

- **X** "(1) Any matter which, by express provision of Federal law, State statute or rule of court shall be rendered confidential or excluded from public discussion." The nature of the matter, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality is attorney/client privilege, HIB reporting, and Litigation Status Report.
- \square "(2) Any matter in which the release of information would impair a right to receive funds from the federal government." The nature of the matter, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality is:
- □ "(3) Any material the disclosure of which constitutes an unwarranted invasion of individual privacy such as any records, data, reports, recommendations, or other personal material of any educational, training, social service, medical, health, custodial, child protection, rehabilitation, legal defense, welfare, housing, relocation, insurance and similar program or institution operated by a public body pertaining to any specific individual admitted to or served by such institution or program, including but not limited to information relative to the individual's personal and family circumstances, and any material pertaining to admission, discharge, treatment, progress or condition of any individual, unless the individual concerned (or, in the case of a minor or incompetent, his guardian) shall request in writing that the same be disclosed publicly." The nature of the matters, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality are:
- \mathbf{X} "(4) Any collective bargaining agreement, or the terms and conditions of which are proposed for inclusion in any collective bargaining

agreement, including the negotiation of terms and conditions with employees or representatives of employees of the public body."

- □ "(5) Any matter involving the purchase, lease or acquisition of real property with public funds, the setting of banking rates or investment of public funds where it could adversely affect the public interest if discussion of such matters were disclosed." The nature of the matter, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality is:
- \square "(6) Any tactics and techniques utilized in protecting the safety and property of the public, provided that their disclosure could impair such protection. Any investigations of violations or possible violations of the law." The nature of the matter, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality is:
- "(7) Any pending or anticipated litigation or contract negotiation in which the public body is, or may become a party. Any matters falling within the attorney-client privilege, to the extent that confidentiality is required in order for the attorney to exercise his ethical duties as a lawyer." The parties to and docket numbers of each item of litigation and/or the parties to each contract discussed are and the nature of the discussion, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality are:
- **X** "(8) Any matter involving the employment, appointment, termination of employment, terms and conditions of employment, evaluation of the performance, promotion or disciplining of any specific prospective public officer or employee or current public officer or employee employed or appointed by the public body, unless all individual employees or appointees whose rights could be adversely affected request in writing that such matter or matters be discussed at a public meeting." Subject to the balancing of the public's interest and the employee's privacy rights under South Jersey Publishing Co. v. New Jersey Expressway Authority, 124 N.J. 478 (1991), the employee(s) and nature of the discussion, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality are:
- \square "(9) Any deliberation of a public body occurring after a public hearing that may result in the imposition of a specific civil penalty upon the responding party or the suspension or loss of a license or permit belonging to the responding party as a result of an act of omission for which the responding party bears responsibility." The nature of the matter, described as specifically as possible without undermining the need for confidentiality is:

WHEREAS, the length of the Executive Session is estimated to be sixty (60) minutes after which the public meeting of the Board shall (select one) \square reconvene and immediately adjourn or \mathbf{X} reconvene and proceed with business where formal action will be taken.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Orange Maplewood Board of Education will go into Executive Session for the above stated reasons only; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby declares that its discussion of the aforementioned subject(s) will be made public at a time when the public's interest in disclosure is greater than any privacy or governmental interest being protected from disclosure.

Motion made by Board President Wittleder, seconded by Board Member Malespina to move resolution 4531 for discussion and voting. Motion passed unanimously.

4531. Whereas the South Orange-Maplewood Board of Education is committed to providing safe extra-curricular activities and offerings to school students; and

Whereas the South Orange-Maplewood Board of Education is aware of reporting on the prevalence of sexual harassment and assault in athletic programs and extra-curricular activities in major public institutions; and

Whereas the South Orange-Maplewood Board of Education has tasked the attorney and District with ongoing and proactive efforts to enhance the effectiveness of its policies and procedures in the area of abuse prevention and expansion of awareness and prevention initiatives, including developing new and more comprehensive training and protocols among staff regarding sexual harassment, sexual violence and relationship violence;

Now, Therefore, be it resolved that the Board approves the following:

- All coaches and activities leads for SOMSD Athletics and Activities will have a SOMSD email address, and SOMSD administration will make sure any coach who is external to SOMSD has been assigned a district email address to use.
- All coaches and activities leaders will use a consistent, District designated application or applications to communicate with students electronically.
- When communicating using any application, the communication must include an additional adult in any messages to students.
- By September 30, all coaches and activities leaders will have to complete Title IX Athletics and Title IX Basics virtual training through SOMSD's Title IX University, which is provided by Institutional Compliance Solutions (ICS), which is SOMSD's Title IX support partner.
- By October 15, all coaches and activities leaders will complete the Responsible Adult Virtual Training that all staff in SOMSD have to complete.
- By October 30, all coaches and activities leaders will complete sexual misconduct and sexual harassment trainings provided by Safe Schools.
- The Board of Education requests that the Superintendent take actions to apprise the school communities, and specifically extra-curricular participants, of these protocols and protections.

Board Member Telesford arrived at 8:30 p.m. Nine Voting Members and Two Student Representatives Present

Board Member Malespina commented that this action has been a long time coming.

Dr. Taylor congratulated the Board on the action taken and shared with the public that this action has been a long time coming. The Board has been very impactful asking for updates on our implementation and it has been an arduous task but one that we take great pride in. We thank all involved including Rich Porfido our Athletic Director and all the coaches who've been complying with the Access and Equity requirements that you just read.

BOARD PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - Board President Wittleder

The Board will convene for its first Fergus Implementation Committee meeting on Monday October 30th. The Fergus Implementation Committee is a committee of the whole meaning all Board Members are encouraged to participate and the meeting will be available to the public and will include one public speaks. The Board has asked Dr. Taylor to present the District's vision of how and when it will Implement all 23 of Fergus's recommendations, which should include the sequence of the priorities of those 23 recommendations, what will get done first, why and when and how these priorities would overlap over the next three years.

The Board would also like to see the funding commitments tied to each of these priorities over the next three years, for example, what are the budget implications for the 2024-25 school year based on what recommendations the district plans to implement first and lastly the Board would like to know who within the district will be the responsible parties for ensuring that the 23 recommendations are being implemented and that we meet the designated timelines.

There will be monthly meetings between the District and the Board via the Fergus Implementation Committee and there will be required quarterly meetings between the District, Dr. Fergus, Justice Wallace and the Black Parents Workshop. Management of implementation and the monitoring of compliance will be handled within the district. So, we look forward to a comprehensive presentation on October $30^{\rm th}$.

This evening the Superintendent presented to the Board policy 5755.1 the District's Access and Equity policy to the agenda for a first read. I believe it is important for the community to understand that the majority of the Board has advised against having this policy added to this evening's agenda for a first read. We have expressed significant concerns about the lack of thoughtful planning behind this policy and it is my view that the Board currently lacks sufficient information to assess the unintended consequences of de-leveling our schools on both our students

and our educators for a first reading of the access and Equity policy.

As with any District policy, it is essential that the policy is close to fully developed. This means that all stakeholders affected by the policy should be consulted and actively engaged during the policy review process. Many Board Members called for the District to work directly with our educators, students, administrators, associations and district families prior to being put up for a first read. Board Members had also asked for a comprehensive presentation from the district that included SOMSD student data to both justify and explain the proposal to de-level the schools prior to being put up for a first read. It is extremely disappointing for the policy to be presented to the Board for a first read without this essential work having been completed.

We've been told that the Board should pass this policy as is without fully understanding how de-leveling would be implemented. We've been told that the Board doesn't have to buy into this policy in its current form and that the District can proceed with adding it to the agenda for adoption regardless of whether we lack the necessary information to even support it and that a policy change of this magnitude does not require a public presentation before the Board and the community prior to this policy's first reading. We do not accept those explanations a majority of the Board believes that the community deserves answers to questions about how de-leveling would work, its implication for our students, the timeline for implementation, the anticipated benefits if they exist and the implications for our teachers.

To be clear, the Board is emphatically committed to codifying Dr. Fergus's 23 recommendations into policy. The Board is resolute in its desire to close the achievement gap and to raise the bar for every student in the district through rigorous curriculum and comprehensive support services as was spelled out in Dr. Fergus's Equity Audit Report. The Board looks forward to understanding why the Superintendent believes that this policy was ready for a first read despite a lack of detailed information and community engagement.

Lastly, I just want to recognize the families that are continuing to have transportation challenges. It is imperative that the District provides a reliable and safe transportation source for our families, a service that would function as the backbone of the Intentional Integration Initiative. The Board is hopeful that the latest round of solutions being implemented by the Transportation Department will achieve this goal. Please know that the Board will continue to advocate on behalf of our District families for every single student to get to and from school safely and on time every single day.

SUPERINTENDENT'S UPDATE

As many are aware, there is a first read of a proposed update to our Access and Equity policy on our agenda this evening. For those who are not familiar with the Board's formal policy procedure, a first read is not a voteable resolution for consideration; it provides the Board, the

public and other stakeholders with an opportunity to review and become familiar with a proposed policy. With the first read the Board and the public have an opportunity to share their thoughts on the proposed policy prior to first read. A proposed policy has been discussed in multiple committee meetings. While the Board Members have different opinions on this update to our District's Access and Equity policy, the consensus agreed that the majority of the proposed policy update reflects our current vital work around this important topic, as well as our future aspirations for a NorthStar as was shared in our recent District goals.

Some Board Members as you just heard, expressed concern regarding how the possible de-leveling of schools will look, how it would be rolled out and how this work competes with Dr. Ferguson's report and recommendations connected to our Black Parents Workshop settlement. Similarly, the Board student representatives and I met and they shared concerns over what this could look like and the unintended consequences of acting with haste, such as possibly having courses lose rigor. Here are a few specific responses to these concerns regarding this first read of the policy update that was just shared.

First a note of thanks and appreciation to our previous Board of Education who authored our current Access & Equity policy acknowledging their effort in passing what was a transformative policy at the time, that continues to impact us we still have high level candidates for vacancies that mentioned our commitment to equity, attracting them to our District. This type of work takes courage commitment and a willingness to partner and listen.

Secondly, this topic was first discussed at our late summer Board Retreat where Board Members Gifford and Telesford shared their personal experiences where they recall living within the levels of Columbia High School. They now tell us of the life lessons their experiences taught them and their observations as teens through their now perspectives as adults serving on our Board of Education. I also acknowledge the work of Board Members Gifford and Winkfield in working together to provide a catalyst for this important consideration and dialogue that our Board members have been able to participate in. I have expressed a number of times during our committee meetings that I am proud to work in a District where these considerations are so passionately debated.

To be very clear, as school leaders and career educators our District cabinet and I do not view this as isolated work. Over the last several years we have been tasked with stepping beyond just a simple review of data. In fact, many of who are in the audience today have watched as we have broken down our student achievement data via demographics and use risk ratio to continue to refine our review, determining the likelihood of success of our students based on their self-reported characteristics. We have shared this data with our district educators continuing to focus on our daily decisions. We know we have to be keenly aware of our own biases and how they can unintentionally impact student outcomes.

Again, to be very clear we do not view the work of reviewing academic segregation and Dr. Ferguson's recommendations via our settlement as competing priorities. There are several recommendations and findings in his report that mention specifically the work that we are discussing. If you go to our website and type in crosswalk you will find a crosswalk document that includes specific mentions of the following goals by Dr. Fergus himself:

- A. Foster heterogeneous student collaboration in math instruction
- B. Ensure that low track students receive the high-quality instruction that they need to become better math students
- C. Create a clear plan and timeline to identify High achieving students from underrepresented backgrounds for higher track math courses
- D. Revisit the choice policy for math selection verbatim

Please know that we do not envision a plan that will be fully implemented for the 24-25 school year, nor do we believe in lowering rigor, expectations or getting rid of AP courses. As we have shown via our Intentional Integration rollout, Columbia High School Humanities adoptions, new phonics program pilot and our Kean University Dual enrollment program that was a pilot to name a few, we believe in a pilot approach and learning from it before a wide scale adoption is considered. We also believe in growing our initiatives and maintaining academic consistency for students. We believe in offering job embedded professional development for our staff and in utilizing the natural breaks and grade spans for significant shifts in pedagogy. This helps us to reduce the anxiety in students and parents while moving forward methodically. Lastly, while we are not formally presenting on this topic tonight, we are happy to share our specific thoughts beyond this brief update and build space for discussions of possibilities as these considerations proceed.

One of our Board approved District goals speaks to the development of a holistic diversity equity and inclusion strategic plan to be developed over multiple years. What we can share now is that there is again no intent for an immediate massive shift in design or offerings or programs for Columbia High School next year. We will be sharing more on October the $30^{\rm th}$.

Before closing on this topic, please note that the Board approval is not required for shifts in pedagogy although the Board does approve curriculum updates. However, this policy is still very important because as school leaders when we need to make tough decisions or significant shifts, policy adoption is key as it gives confidence to all involved, our administration, teachers, parents, prospective members of District etc. It helps them know that this is not a haphazard or singular decision that it is indeed supported in the fabric of our district and is an understood and accepted part of our beliefs and our tenants as a learning community. In our view Dr. Fergus's recommendations, the A&E first read policy, our work on curriculum development, Intentional Integration Initiative, Equal Opportunity Schools, supporting students who have exceptionalities and their families, providing students' the academic and social emotional

support that they need to become the leaders that they have the potential to be they are all interdependent. In other words, we again do not see them as competing priorities. We do not see this work through an eitheror lens. We see them as both and the first leg in this journey is the work that has already been shared and

occurred with our middle school math teachers and our District Administration team. We look forward to sharing this with you on October $30^{\rm th}$.

BOARD PRESIDENT'S STATEMENT

The school board meeting is a business meeting in public and not a meeting with the public. Oftentimes it may appear to members of our audience that the Board of Education takes action with very little comment and in many cases a unanimous vote. Before a matter is placed on the agenda at a public meeting, the Administration has thoroughly reviewed the matter with the Superintendent of Schools/Chief School Administrator (CSA). If the Superintendent of Schools/Chief School Administrator is satisfied that the matter is ready to be presented to the Board of Education, it is then referred to the appropriate Board Committee. The Members of the Board Committee work with Administration and the Superintendent to assure that the members fully understand the matter. After the committee discusses the matter, it is then shared with the other Board members for consideration. Only then is it placed on the agenda for Board discussion and action at a public meeting.

Thank you for coming in-person and dialing-in by phone this evening. The South Orange - Maplewood Board of Education certainly respects that you've taken the time out of your busy day to address the Board at tonight's meeting. We value public involvement in our school district, and we are eager to hear what you have to say. The board does have time limits by policy, and it will be enforcing those to enable as many people to speak as possible this evening. Each individual will be given three minutes to speak, please do your best to stay within the time afforded to you. The first public comment period is usually limited to one hour and the second public comment period may be limited to thirty minutes. All input shared with the Board of Education is taken very seriously, and will inform future deliberations and work by the Board of Education and its committees.

SOMSD teachers Lisa Rosenberg and Jesse Hein expressed concerns about curriculum and resources.

SOMSD Counselor Yolande Fleming expressed concerns regarding the Freshman Academy.

SOMSD teachers and SOMEA leadership expressed concerns regarding building maintenance, cleanliness and safety as well as difficulties of teaching while construction is taking place during the school day: Shira Lincoln, Tivoli Hunt, Patrice Massung, Jose Martinez and Jen Skates.

The following SOMSD teachers expressed concerns regarding Special Education staffing and lack of support to meet student needs: Heather Mittiga, Claire Sinclair, Jen Skates.

The following SOMSD teachers spoke about the lack of support for certain clubs such as the Ladies of Leadership and the Men With Purpose organizations, as well as approval of stipends for staff supporting these clubs and organizations: Danielle Cayo, Abiodun Banner, Jose Martinez.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

Dr. Taylor provided the following updates regarding construction:

Annual Report of Student Safety Data System (SSDS) - Dr. Kevin Gilbert

Dr. Gilbert presented the Annual Report of Student Safety Data System for January 2023 - June 2023 and totals for the 2022-2023 School Year. By law, all New Jersey public school districts must use the Student Safety Data System (SSDS) to report all incidents of violence, vandalism, weapons, substance abuse, and HIB incidents that occur in their schools. SSDS has replaced the Electronic Violence and Vandalism Reporting System (EVVRS) and the Harassment, Intimidation, Bullying investigations trainings and programs systems. The district reports this information to

the Board and the public on a semi-annual basis. The last report was on August 24, 2023 which covered incidents from September 2022 through December 2022.
