Columbia High School Principal Elizabeth Aaron has been invited to participate in the 5th Principals at ED event at the U.S. Department of Education and to meet with U.S. Secretary of Education John B. She was invited to this prestigious event following a very successful visit to CHS from several representatives from the USDOE including Alicia Perez-Katz, Principal Ambassador Fellow, and Ruthanne Buck, Senior Advisor to the US Secretary of Education.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Ms. Baker declared the minutes of the Executive and Public Sessions of March 21,2016 approved as presented.

SUPERINTENDENT'S MONTHLY UPDATE - Dr. Ramos

Goal 1 Student learning and promoting the intellectual growth of all students:

- Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) testing is underway, and is proceeding smoothly so far.
- Lead Intervention and Referral Services administrators met to share best practices in identifying students who need more challenge and/or more support, and better meeting their needs.

Goal 2 Professional Staff:

- An update on professional development is on for discussion this evening.
- Specialists from the state conducted training for all principals and HIB specialists on updates to the HIB policy.

Goal 3 Engagement and Outreach:

- Columbia High School in Action Night took place and was extremely well attended. Hundreds of students and parents came to get a glimpse of the broad array of clubs, athletics and activities offered. Highlights included a fencing exhibition, performances from the chorus, band and orchestra, and a trip to the observatory at the top of the clock tower.
- Columbia High School is working to help current 8th grade students and their families make a successful transition to high school, including:
 - Special invitations to School in Action Night so that rising freshmen could get an early look at all that Columbia High School has to offer.
 - Ninth grade transition night with general orientation programs as well as a special program on athletics and activities on the high school level.
 - Letters from the Principal and Director of Guidance are going home with recommended placements for 2016-2017.
- Letters are going home this week to all 5^{th} grade families recommending math placement for 2016-2017 and providing information about all of the math options available in 6^{th} grade.
- K-8 families are invited to attend "Maker Madness." This interactive day provides children and their families with opportunities to explore science, technology, engineering, art and math with more than 20 hands-on activities. Appreciation to the Achieve Foundation for supporting this family exploration of "STEAM Education".
- A Community Forum on Security and School Climate is being planned in conjunction with the two towns.

Goal 4 Resource Management:

- The 2016-2017 Budget will be advertised in the News Record. The Board of Education is scheduled to vote to adopt the budget at a special meeting on May $2^{\rm nd}$.
- A State Aid Workshop for the community, in partnership with both towns and with the staff of Assemblywoman Mila Jasey, is being planned.

- Registration Update:
 - o Open registration for all grades begins Monday, May $2^{\rm nd}$ and will go throughout the summer. We encourage people to register their children as soon as they possibly can, so that we can make appropriate class assignments and ensure that we have teachers and sections to accommodate all of our students.
 - o Kindergarten Orientations will take place in late May and early June. If you have an incoming kindergartener and have not yet registered, then please register as soon as possible so that your child's school receives the paperwork in time to invite you to the orientation.
 - o We are closely monitoring kindergarten registration. At this point, Tuscan and Marshall are close to full. Families who missed the early kindergarten registration period and who live in the catchment zone for these two schools may be registered for a different district school for 2016-2017, in accordance with long-standing Board policy.

Goal Five Creating a framework for advancing the work of the district including the collaborative development of a comprehensive Strategic Plan:

- The first monthly meeting with the co-chairs of the Action Planning teams has taken place. This was an extremely useful evening, as the co-chairs brainstormed solutions to obstacles which they have encountered, shared ideas, and discussed areas for future collaboration.
- The action planning teams continue to meet, and are currently writing specific sets of deliverables to accomplish each strategy, and gathering information regarding possible approaches to practices, protocols, services or programs to accomplish each of the deliverables.
- We have invited students to serve on almost every action planning team, and will have students placed on the remaining teams this week.

Goal Six Securing required external approvals:

• We are still awaiting a response from the Office of Civil Rights (OCR) to our latest submissions.

Calendar update:

Every year, the district schedules three emergency school closing days. If the district uses fewer than the allotted three days, then "give back days" are scheduled near Memorial Day Weekend. This year, the district, so far, was only closed for one day. Therefore, unless we use an emergency closing day in the meantime, the district will be closed for both Friday May $27^{\rm th}$, and for Tuesday May $31^{\rm st}$.

South Orange Middle School will have additional time added on at the end of the year to account for the two days closed for water main breaks. All students will report on June 21 and June 22, for scheduled half days not having a staggered end of year. This makes up one day. All students will also report on June 23rd to make up the second day. This is being done instead of any other option, after consultation with the county superintendent, in order to minimize any impact on families over the Memorial Day weekend.

BOARD PRESIDENT'S UPDATE - Ms. Baker

Ms. Baker discussed collaboration with town officials, the community, and forming a coalition with other communities, on advocating regarding state aid funding. Also discussed was planning a forum on School Safety with the two towns.

STUDENT LIAISON REPORT - Mr. Saulean

Mr. Saulean reported that the first Columbia High School talent show to raise funds to support the Senior Prom was a success. The student council also scheduled a volleyball tournament, a blood drive and is coordinating a spirit week to culminate in a pep rally. Finalization of Hall of Fame nominees is in process.

DISCUSSION

Curricular Realignment Update (per Access and Equity Policy) - Ms. Grierson

Ms. Grierson gave an update on curricular realignment per the access and equity policy. The ultimate goal is for staff to learn to address the needs of all students, providing proper support for all courses to make students ready for higher level courses. The process begins in pre-kindergarten and kindergarten. The action plan for curricular realignment includes: redesigning curriculum, instruction and evaluation, reimagining classrooms for deeper learning and proper implementation of the access and equity policy.

Some key points addressed by curricular realignment are as follows:

- Rewrite social studies curriculum during the 16-17 school year for implementation in the 17-18 school year.
- Help staff plan for differentiated instruction in all content areas across all grades.
- Plan summer school and hiring teachers for credit recovery and step up classes.
- Select middle school students to receive academic support.
- Next year beyond the bell will be available at all elementary schools.

Professional Development Update - Ms. Grierson

This year professional development focused mostly on cultural competency and restorative justice. In elementary schools emphasis was placed on Teachers College and math development across grades. Guidance counselors at the middle schools and high school attended professional development workshops on restorative justice. New this year, SOMEA members are choosing additional professional development to take place by June 30. Professional activities are being planned for next year in collaboration with staff and principals to ensure that there is support for access and equity.

Board members discussion included, but was not limited to, the following:

- How do you factor student input into reworking curriculum?
- Concerned that cultural competency training is not reaching more staff.
- Access to curriculum reference points for parents, especially with placement letters going home.
- Resources are built into the budget to support Seth Boyden and have a large committee, including community members, to work on school-wide use of title I funds.
- Curriculum will address diverse learners. Students need to see themselves in the curriculum so we need to reach multicultural learners.

Policy - Mr. Stern

Policy 3351.1 - Teaching Staff Member Disabilities Pursuant to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of $1973 - 1^{\rm st}$ Reading.

Policy 4351.1 - Support Staff Member Disabilities Pursuant to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 - $1^{\rm st}$ Reading.

Policy 5750.1 - Student Disabilities Pursuant to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of $1973 - 1^{st}$ Reading.

Mr. Stern introduced the three policies on for $1^{\rm st}$ reading which address 504 laws designed to protect staff that can satisfy functions of their jobs with reasonable accommodation and require that students receive accommodations to access general education programs. These policies are good first steps towards institutionalizing the response for 504 accommodations.

Policy 5339 Screening for Dyslexia is on for second reading. The policy is being revised to reflect revised regulations by the Department of Education.

- Board needs to vote to eliminate the accelerated program
- Language arts has differentiated instruction built into the classroom
- The content in higher grades is inappropriate for the younger students. Some students don't have the maturity for the social level of discussions.
- Concerned that being asked to consider elimination of course without the curriculum being available to the Board or the community.
- We are trying to move towards individualized learning and choice and this would be a step backwards. Should find a way to support students who are accelerated with readings that are age appropriate.
