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Student Safety Data System

- By law, all N.J. public school districts (including charter schools) must use the Student Safety Data System (SSDS) to report all incidents of violence, vandalism, weapons, substance abuse, and HIB incidents that occur in their schools.
- SSDS has replaced the Electronic Violence and Vandalism Reporting System (EVVRS).
- SSDS has replaced the Harassment, Intimidation, Bullying -Investigations Trainings and Programs system.

Incident category totals may differ from total incidents due to multiple offenses selected for one incident. I.e., student may have multiple offenses for one incident.

Review of the Data (review of our practices)

While the overall incidents in the District went down in the categories of **violence**, **vandalism**, **weapons and HIB**, there was a tremendous increase in the number of <u>substance abuse incidents</u>. During training, it was revealed that only "positive" cases of substance abuse were reported in previous years, specifically in the high school -- therefore resulting in an under-reporting of incidents. According to the SSDS Guidance, the substance abuse reporting is expanded to include the following:

Substance Possession

A student is found with one of the reportable substance types in their locker or vehicle, or on their person. A substance found on school grounds with no identified offender should not be reported.

Substance Sale/Distribution

A student sells, buys, or gives one of the reportable substance types to others, employs others to do the same, or is in possession of substances in such quantities or under such circumstances that it may be inferred that the student intended to distribute to others.

Substance Use Confirmed

A student is suspected of being under the influence of one of the reportable substance types and use is confirmed by medical examination per N.J.S.A.18A:40A-12.

Substance Suspected, Refused Exam

A student is suspected of being under the influence of one of the reportable substance types and medical examination was refused.

2019-2020 HIB Trainings & Programs to Date

A concerted effort was made to provide more training to staff across the District for the 2019-20 school year. There were 9 District-wide trainings which included central office staff, bus drivers, coaches, paras, custodial staff, District Administrators, etc. Additionally, each school was trained by the District HIB coordinator on the HIB policy and reporting requirements. Anti-Bullying Specialists doubled the effort by including training on staff development days. An overall effort was made to improve and change the climate and culture of the District by including lessons in the classroom, particularly during the Week of Respect. With the use of the HIBster tool, reporting and tracking incidents, for both HIB and other offenses renders reporting easier. For the 2020-21 school year, continued focus on accurate reporting will be emphasized. Schools will again receive District level training on policy and procedures, which will include administrators, teachers and support staff.

- + Although HIBster can be used to track an investigation HIB or Code of Conduct, such incidents need to be accurately reported in PowerSchool;
- Administrators and support staff need to ensure that the correct incidents are recorded in SSDS such as substance abuse in accordance with the SSDS Guidance;

Week of Respect - October 5 - 9, 2020

- The Week of Respect is another opportunity to draw attention to improving the culture and climate in the District. The "Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act (P.L.2010, c.122) requires that the week beginning with the first Monday in October of each year be designated as the Week of Respect and School Violence Awareness Week in New Jersey. To recognize the importance of social and emotional learning and character education, school districts, charter schools and renaissance school projects are required to observe the week by providing age-appropriate instruction focused on preventing HIB."

Improving Reporting Levers...

While we acknowledge that we are seeing a positive trajectory in some trends of this important area, including the accuracy with which we report our challenges with substance abuse and our celebration of our 'Week of Respect' across our schools.

We also must be transparent in reporting that we must focus this year of ensuring that all levers of reporting are identical. To that end, we dug deeper into our previous reporting data and found gaps that will be addressed as we move forward. Corrective action steps will include professional development for those responsible in our schools as well as a review of the granular circumstances that could cause a report to be made in one platform but not another.
