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Student Safety Data System

- + By law, all N.J. public school districts (including charter schools) must use the Student Safety Data System (SSDS) to report all incidents of violence, vandalism, weapons, substance abuse, and HIB incidents that occur in their schools.
- SSDS has replaced the Electronic Violence and Vandalism Reporting System (EVVRS).
- SSDS has replaced the Harassment, Intimidation, Bullying -Investigations Trainings and Programs system.

Incident category totals may differ from total incidents due to multiple offenses selected for one incident. I.e., student may have multiple offenses for one incident.

What the Data Shows?

Significant Decrease in Incidents in all categories

- + It is apparent that COVID-19 and virtual instruction was the overall factor for the decrease of incidents.
- + HIB incidents also decreased but continues to be a serious concern as nearly all of the reported incidents took place in a virtual setting. Social media plays a huge role in this area and staff faced obstacles with investigations, including getting access to students (especially virtual students), parental interference and other factors. In part of the training for the ABS, the administration will work on creating best standards and protocols for obtaining student statements to ensure that the investigation moves forward in a timely fashion.
- + In the past, the District provided HIB training for parents which included the definition of HIB, the HIB policy and parental rights. Participation in such outreach was low. Additional efforts could be made to parents to provide training as we transition to the new school year.



2020-2021 HIB Trainings & Programs to Date* (Report Period 1 only (Dec - Jan).

A concerted effort was made to provide more training to staff across the District for the 2019-20 and 2020-21 school years. To date, all schools, except one, which is scheduled for training for early June, have received training for teaching and support staff. Each school was trained by the District HIB coordinator on the HIB policy and reporting requirements. Central office and including bus drivers, paras, and District Administrators received training during professional development day in October 2020. Coaches, maintenance/facilities workers, custodians and other contracted staff are scheduled to receive training before the school year ends. Though virtual, an overall effort was made to improve and change the climate and culture of the District by including lessons in the classroom, particularly during the Week of Respect which was previously shared with the Board. For the 2021-22 school year, continued focus on accurate reporting will be emphasized – though there is vast improvement for this year. Schools will again receive District level training on policy and procedures, which will include administrators, teachers and support staff.

Week of Respect - October 5 - 9, 2020

- + The Week of Respect is another opportunity to draw attention to improving the culture and climate in the District. The "Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act (P.L.2010, c.122) requires that the week beginning with the first Monday in October of each year be designated as the Week of Respect and School Violence Awareness Week in New Jersey. To recognize the importance of social and emotional learning and character education, school districts, charter schools and renaissance school projects are required to observe the week by providing age-appropriate instruction focused on preventing HIB."
- + Although virtual, all schools participated in Week of Respect activities such as:
 - Newsletter messages and video to school families
 - School spirit/school colors days
 - "Chalk" it up to Respect/Kindness messages on social media
 - Tik Tok challenges
 - Classroom activities -- "How do I see myself T-shirts"


Tuesday, October 6: MIX IT UP DAY: Students, staff and caregivers are invited to wear mismatched socks and celebrate how we are all uniquely different!

Transitional changes

Continued focus on training for staff and administrators on Code of Conduct implementation, HIB reporting and investigation, and data reporting;

Although HIBster can be used to track an investigation - HIB or Code of Conduct, such incidents need to be accurately reflected in HIBster and accurately reported in PowerSchool if applicable;

Ensuring that administrators and support staff correctly record incidents in SSDS;

+ Continual Improvement

Due to COVID-19 and the virtual instruction platform, incidents across the board were limited. HIB complaints, however, continue to be a challenge - particularly incidents involving social media. This is an area around culture and climate that needs to be strengthened through education and programs. In a normal school year, the District would have many school specific programs to engage students in discussions about HIB, acceptance, and equity - usually sponsored by the Parenting Center and the PTAs. Moving forward, it is anticipated that such programs will be resumed.

Improving Reporting Levers

While we can all acknowledge that this year was an anomaly, due to the small number of incidents that occurred overall, accurately reporting this information has not been a concern. Only one incident has not been entered into SSDS.

With that in mind, we would like to carry on that positive trajectory by continuing professional development and pushing out reminders as often as necessary. COVID19 made us rethink how we accomplished these important tasks and put our technology knowledge to the test. For the next school year, the emphasis will continue to be on accuracy with overall reporting, transparency in reporting and ensuring that all levers of reporting are identical.
